**Deliberate play
and
Deliberate save**

Law 11 – Deliberate Play

The Law:

“A player in an offside position receiving the ball from an opponent who deliberately plays the ball (except from a deliberate save by an opponent) is not considered to have gained an advantage.”

The LOTG are not to protect bad plays.

Deliberate Play vs Deflection Considerations

DELIBERATE PLAY

Player goes to play the ball >
ACTION - Conscious

Time, Options

Control of the body
Not the outcome of the action

Distance, Space

DEFLECTION

Ball goes to the player >
REACTION - Instinctive

NO Options, surprised,
unexpected

NO Control of the body

Never expect players doing
nothing

Law 11 – Deliberate Save

The Law:

A save is when a player stops, or attempts to stop, a ball which is going into or very close to the goal with any part of the body except the hands/arms (unless the goalkeeper within the penalty area).”

Law 11 Offside

Location of the Restart

Law 11 – IFK Location

- If an offside offense occurs, the referee awards an IFK.
- The IFK is taken from where the player in an offside position becomes involved in active play by:
 1. Interfering with play,
 2. Interfering with an opponent or
 2. Gaining an advantage

including if it is in the player's own half of the field of play

Law 11 – Offside Position

A player is in an offside position if:

- **Any part of the head, body or feet is in the opponent's half (excluding the halfway line) and**
- **Any part of the head, body or feet is nearer to the opponent's goal line than both the ball and the second-last opponent.**

Law 11 – Offside Offense

A player in an offside position at the moment the ball is played or touched by a team-mate is only penalized on becoming involved in active play by:

- **Interfering with play**
- **interfering with an opponent**
- **Gaining advantage**

Summary

What is the difference between offside position and offside offense?

Offside Position

- Any part of the head, body or feet is in the opponent's half (excluding the halfway line) and
- Any part of the head, body or feet is nearer to the opponent's goal line than both the ball and the second-last opponent.

Offside Offense

A player in an offside position at the moment the ball is played or touched* by a team-mate is only penalized on becoming involved in active play by:

- Interfering with play
- interfering with an opponent
- Gaining advantage

Summary

What is the difference between deliberate save and deliberate play?

Deliberate Save:

A defender stops, or attempts to stop, a ball going into or very close to the goal with any part of the body except the hands/arms (unless the goalkeeper within the penalty area).

Offside

Reaction: not a deliberate play

- Unexpected: no clear line of sight
- Factors: time, distance, speed of ball
- A reflex movement

Summary

- **Deliberate play**

- *A player in an offside position receiving the ball from an opponent who deliberately plays the ball (except from a deliberate save by an opponent) is not considered to have gained an advantage.”.*

Not Offside

- Action: deliberate play
 - Option: choose to perform an action
 - Calculated movement toward ball
 - Poor execution of action

What are the most common mistakes observed for inaccurate offside offenses?

- Lack of concentration on the play.
- Lack of understanding of the play.
