A REFEREE ALLOWS THE GAME TO CONTINUE WHEN A PLAYER IS GUILTY OF A CAUTIONABLE OFFENCE. THE REFEREE STOPS PLAY TO AWARD A FREE KICK IN FAVOR OF THE TEAM AGAINST WHOM THE INITIAL OFFENSE WAS COMMITTED. A PLAYER TAKES THE FREE KICK QUICKLY TO GAIN AN ADVANTAGE.

- A. This is permitted. The referee will allow the kick to be taken quickly. After the kick is taken, the guilty player will not be shown the yellow card.
- B. This is not permitted. The referee will not allow the kick to be taken quickly. A yellow card is shown to the guilty player before the game is restarted.
- C. This is permitted. The referee will allow the kick to be taken quickly. The guilty player will be shown the yellow card at the next stoppage of the game.
- **D.** None of the above.



A PLAYER PLAYS IN A DANGEROUS MANNER RAISING HIS LEG WHEN THE OPPONENT TRIES TO HEAD THE BALL AND MAKES CONTACT WITH THE OPPONENT'S HEAD. THE REFEREE SHOULD:

- A. Award a direct free kick or a penalty kick.
- **B.** Award an indirect free kick and caution the player.
- C. Award a direct free kick and caution the player.
- D. After showing the yellow card to the guilty player, restart the game with a drop ball.

RECOGNIZING TIME WASTING TACTICS August In-Service Review

- Referees must take this aspect of game control back into their hands.
- Time wasting is an insidious, invidious process, which, if allowed to continue and spread, will take the game away from the honest players.
- Unchecked, time wasting leads to player frustration and anger, and can ultimately result in fouls, severe misconduct, and violence.
- The referee must act quickly, at the first sign of illegal delaying tactics, to stop them.

RESTART MODIFICATIONS

There are 8 ways to restart the game.

- Kick-Off (KO)
- Dropped Ball (DB)
- Direct Free Kick (DFK)
- Indirect Free Kick (IFK)
- Penalty Kick (PK)
- Throw-in (TI)
- Goal Kick (GK)
- Corner Kick (CK)

Let's review them based on:

- The reason for the restart
- The direction of the restart
- When the ball is in play
- If a second touch is allowed
- If a player can be punished for offside
- If a goal can be scored directly from it
- Opponents' distance
- If the whistle is needed
- Position of the ball



RESTART MODIFICATIONS DROPPED BALL

Offenses and Sanctions – Law 8

If a dropped ball enters the goal without touching at least two players play is restarted with:

- o a goal kick if it enters the opponents' goal
- a corner kick if it enters the team's goal



- Direct free kicks are awarded to the opposing team of a player, substitute, substituted or sent off player, or team official guilty of an offense - Law 13.
- 2. What the LOTG now require:
 - a) Extra person on the Field of Play
 If play is stopped and the interference was by:
 - a team official, substitute, substituted or sent off player, play restarts with direct free kick or penalty kick – Law 3.



- 2. What the LOTG now require: (continue)
 - b) Player Outside the Field of Play Law 3

If a player who requires the referee's permission to re-enter the field of play re-enters without the referee's permission,

If the referee stops play, it must be restarted:

- with a direct free kick from the position of the interference
- with an indirect free kick from the position of the ball when play was stopped if there was no interference

- 2. What the LOTG now require: (continue)
 - c) Offenses and Sanctions Law 4

A player who enters without permission must be cautioned and if play is stopped to issue the caution, an indirect free kick is awarded from the position of the ball when play was stopped, unless there was interference in which case a direct free kick (or penalty kick) is awarded from the position of the interference.



- 2. What the LOTG now require: (continue)
 - d) Direct Free Kick Law 12

A direct free kick is awarded if a player commits any of the following offences:

- handles the ball deliberately (except for the goalkeeper within their penalty area)
- holds an opponent
- bites or spits at someone
- throws an object at the ball, opponent or match official, or makes contact with the ball with a held object



- 2. What the LOTG now require: (continue)
 - e) Advantage Law 12

Advantage should not be applied in situations involving serious foul play, violent conduct or a second cautionable offence unless there is a clear opportunity to score a goal. The referee must send off the player when the ball is next out of play but if the player plays the ball or challenges/interferes with an opponent, the referee will stop play, send off the player and restart with an indirect free kick, unless the player committed a more serious offence.



- 2. What the LOTG now require: (continue)
 - f) Restart of Play after Fouls and Misconduct
 - If the ball is in play and a player commits an offence inside the field of play against:
 - an opponent indirect or direct free kick or penalty kick
 - a team-mate, substitute, substituted or sent off player, team official or a match official – a direct free kick or penalty kick
 - any other person a dropped ball



- 2. What the LOTG now require: (continue)
 - g) Restart of Play after Fouls and Misconduct Law 12

If, when the ball is in play:

- a player commits an offence against a match official or an opposing player, substitute, substituted or sent off player, or team official <u>outside the field</u> of play or
- a substitute, substituted or sent off player, or team official commits an offence against, or interferes with, an opposing player or match official <u>outside the field</u> of play,

play is restarted with a free kick on the boundary line nearest to where the offence/interference occurred; a penalty kick is awarded if this is a direct free kick offence within the offender's penalty area.

RESTART MODIFICATIONS

- If an offence is committed <u>outside the field</u> of play against a player, substitute, substituted player or team official <u>of their own team</u>, play is restarted with an <u>indirect free kick on the boundary line closest to where the offence occurred</u>.
- If a player makes <u>contact with the ball with an object</u> (boot, shinguard etc.) <u>held in the hand play is restarted with a direct free kick (or penalty kick</u>).



RESTART MODIFICATIONS

If a substitute, substituted or sent off player, player temporarily off the field of play or team official throws or kicks an object onto the field of play and it interferes with play, an opponent or match official, play is restarted with a direct free kick (or penalty kick) where the object interfered with play or struck or would have struck the opponent, match official or the ball.



SUMMARY

 - Within the penalty area: penalty kick
 - Near the boundary line: Free kick
